
undeveloped property on our west shoreline, so yes,

TURTLE COVE NATURE PRESERVE (Proposed)

November, 2021

Love the land, Pass it on.




We have the opportunity to protect a gorgeous and ecologically significant bay and create a nature preserve on one of Grand Traverse County's most popular and beloved inland lakes.

The proposed Turtle Cove Nature Preserve along Arbutus Lake is one of the highest ranking parcels identified for protection in our priority land atlas. It encompasses the majority of a shallow-water bay, along with additional frontage on the main body of the lake totaling over .75 mile undeveloped shoreline. Collectively, the property has more than three

quarters of a mile of undeveloped water frontage, making it critical for water quality on Arbutus Lake.

In addition to water quality benefits, this proposed preserve packs a major punch in terms of wildlife habitat. The shallow water of Turtle Cove provides habitat for scores of fish, reptiles, amphibians and invertebrate species. Along with emergent marsh and bog habitats, the property also contains mesic forest with areas of open field (dominated by bracken fern and little bluestem) and early-successional forest. There is also an active eagle's nest on the property.

While not small in its own right at roughly 120 acres, the property also benefits from being



contiguous to Pines Park (a natural area owned by East Bay Township) along with a tract of state land. Such connectivity is critical for wildlife movement throughout increasingly fragmented habitats. The property will also lend itself to a scenic and enjoyable trail system.

Undeveloped shorelines are becoming increasingly rare throughout GTRLC's service area, particularly near the regions' population center. This protection effort presents a relatively rare chance to safeguard unspoiled habitat.

Your gift will:


The total fundraising need for this project, which reflects a generous bargain sale by the landowner, is **\$2,473,007***.

Camp Hayo-Went-Ha News By Amanda Macaluso

In the light of the excitement surrounding the awareness and preservation of the Turtle Cove conservation initiative I wanted to share the history YMCA Camp Arbutus Hayo-Went-Ha has with Turtle Cove.

It was Grace Macdonald who started the once favorite activity – turtle hunting. She was cruising Arbutus Lake on her pontoon one summer and noticed the great number of turtles in lake 4 that we now all know as Turtle Cove.

The campers used to grab row boats or canoes and some even were lucky enough to be assigned to Mac's pontoon boat to all head to Turtle Cove for the start of the activity. The idea was to catch as many turtles as possible from their boats but inevitably many ended up falling or diving into the water. "We broke all the rules," Mac said with a laugh. Campers would mark the turtle shells with nail polish to identify which ones had been caught before putting them back in the lake.



They even began naming the outstanding turtle hunter every year and that camper was honored and recognized by adding their name to a plaque that still hangs to this day in Trailside Lodge. As a staff member in 1996 I remember this tradition well but it was determined that it really was not the safest activity for our campers. It was also decided that the disturbance to the natural environment was too much and it was best to let the turtles live their lives without the torment of being captured and marked. This article has been adapted from the 100th history book. Please email me if you would like a history book as I am happy to give each of you one if you do not already have one.

In other news – I would also like to thank again everyone who helped us last summer in the kitchen. It was an amazing help to our kitchen staff and also a fun way to get to know you all a little better. This year is looking like it will be a little easier to staff the kitchen with the addition of some international staff but we would certainly welcome volunteers if you are willing and able. Many of our programs have been filled already but we do still have a few camper openings in some programs, especially the 3rd, 4th, 5th and 6th grade age group in the first part of the summer. summer, please send them my way for more information. Thank you all for being such great neighbors. I really appreciate your support and friendship and I look forward to giving you all a wave as you go by on the lake this summer.

Arbutus Lake Level Report

The Arbutus Lake level has increased by 5.88 inches during the Winter season. The final reading of 2021 was taken on December 5th, a measurement of 804.55' above sea level (ASL). The first reading of 2022 was taken on April 22nd, a measurement of 805.02' ASL. The lake is 1.44 inches higher than it was on the same date last year. It remains 2.4 inches lower the highest level on record, 805.22' ASL, measured October 23, 2020. It is 37.08 inches higher than the lowest level on record, 801.93' ASL, measured September 18, 2011.



Weed Report Spring 2022

Milfoil - We are planning on treating the Lake once the water temperatures reach at least 60 - 65 degrees F at 10 feet of depth. Currently, the weather has been cold and the water temperature is having a hard time increasing, so doubt that we will be treating before the first week in June. The treatment is weather dependent and we like to accomplish it in the middle of the week so we do not interfere with the weekend recreation.

- Meeting Called to Order: by President Sue Foster at 9:00 AM (East Bay Township Hall)
- Roll Call: (Present) Sue Foster, Keith Day, Caitlin Falenski, Jodi Derylo, Brandon Falenski, Harry Knol, Nancy McCullick, Cindy Swift, Mike Bobrowski, Edie Gibbs, Allyson Tinker (phone); (absent) Randy Bancino & Kathi Mudd,
- Approval of the Current Agenda: moved by Nancy McCullick; second by Jodi Derylo; all in favor
- Guest Speakers: Kate Pearson, Senior Charitable Giving Specialist & Steve Lagerquist, Senior Stewardship for the Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy. GTRLC is thrilled for the potential of preserving Turtle Cove. In December 2021, GTRLC entered into an agreement with Casey & Dana Cowell to work towards protecting this property (120 acres). Total purchase price: \$2.473million. Currently raised \$1.1million. On September 1, 2022 a report will be assessed by the Board of GTRLC to determine if they will option all or only a portion of the proposed land. A trail system will be created in a sustainable way by the Conservancy; will allow access without hurting the natural environment. They do not plan on having water access on the property. A bench will be at water's edge but no dock system. There will not be access to this property from the state campground. Jodi proposed including a "no swimming" sign by the lake because of the muck & safety issues. Parking (gravel) lot would consist of 5-8 spaces off of Yellow Birch (final location not determined yet). No restrooms. No motorized vehicles; purely pedestrians (hikers & snowshoeing). No hunting other than a reserve exception by GTRLC for potential, controlled bow hunting, if necessary. Protecting the natural shoreline is a paramount focus for GTRLC. May 14th is the first GTRLC hike on the property. GTRLC's goal is to have a public hike once a week to show the property & learn more about the process – possibly in July 2022.
- Review and approval of September 25, 2021 meeting minutes: Jodi motioned; Keith second; all in favor.
- Treasurer's report review and approval (including year-end report): Jodi motioned; Nancy second; all in favor.

Old Business:

- **Newsletter (Jodi)**: Turtle Cove GTRLC project will be included. April 30th is deadline for submission of topics. Camp spring cleanup May 13, 14 & 15.
- Website Development (Nancy): draft completed; BEAUTIFUL. URL still needs to be secured.
- Invasive species status. (Mike): water temp needs to be 60 degrees; only 42 degrees right now. Thinking end of May, into June. Specific date TBD. Chemical needs to be ordered by Mike.
- Water quality and testing report (Edie Gibbs or Sue Foster): Phosphorous test is done
 within 2 weeks of ice out (will be done today). Dissolved oxygen meter can be rented through
 MiCorps; needs to be done every 3 years.
- Water level report (Brandon): 805.02'; 2.4" lower than high from October 23, 2020. Up 5.64" from last reading in December 2021. Minimum level was September 2011 & we are 37" above that. Mike recommends looking at the flow of water at the channel in lake #1; it is flowing but concerned the construction disrupted the outflow. Spider Lake does not have an official measurement tool, but it seems up. Edie will call Drain Commissioner re: a flow meter.
- Loon nesting status (Jodi): will be going out this week at the old location on lake #5.

- Welcome Packets information (Kathi): Kathi has a stack of them & she is welcoming new neighbors as they become official.
- Archives (Keith): all current items (minutes, newsletters, financials, etc.) are uploaded to google docs at the time they are released. Need to determine what historical docs have legal weighting & what to upload.
- New Signs for Turtle Cove, Boat Launch & South Lake 2 (Jodi): working on verbiage & location still TBD. Consolidated the boat launch sign with this bullet point also.
- Governmental Relations Committee (Brandon or Nancy): Parks Commission: planned redevelopment of Lake #5 Park. Received EGLE permit beginning of March. Most likely behind schedule for a Spring 2022 start. ZBA: boating decision at Lakemore Resort. ZBA upheld the existing decision (630sqft of total watercraft). Planning Commission: GOREC PUD recommended for approval to the Board (May 9 public hearing). Nancy had a conversation with Preston Taylor, Zoning Administrator at the Township: new builds are provided with a copy of the Forest Lakes Overlay to ensure the checklist is reviewed & complied with during the build process.
- Proposed Amendment to Forest Lakes Overlay Update: see above re: Preston Taylor's new process of new builds & Forest Lakes checklist. Consolidate with Governmental Relations bullet point.
- **GT County Soil Erosion**: Faith Sousa with the County does not have to enforce the Forest Lakes Overlay but is cognizant of the rules & flags the applications appropriately. Consolidate with Governmental Relations bullet point.
- Communications with Non-ALA members: need to cross reference mailing list vs emailing list & see who is missing. Nancy & Edie will work together on this.
- Educational Presentation to MLS w/Spider & Rennie Lakes: Sue proposed idea to pre-educate buyers in the Forest Lakes Area. Nancy is in support. More to come on this.
- Conservation Committee Update (Nancy): see above re: Kate's presentation with GTRLC.

New Business:

- ALA fundraising for Grand Traverse Regional Land Conservancy: Nancy suggested a
 fundraising event at her home and/or tent on Turtle Cove happy hour with opportunity to
 make donations + pontoon rides.
- Other New Business Topics: seedling purchase in the future does ALA want to get involved with a bulk purchase & offer them to members? Try to organize for 2023 sale.
